Described and Captioned Media Program (DCMP)

The Described and Captioned Media Program (DCMP) provides services to benefit students who are blind, visually impaired, deaf, hard of hearing, or deaf-blind. These services include (1) a free-loan library of described and captioned educational media that is available to school personnel and families; (2) information, available to everyone, related to accessible media; and (3) guidelines and assistance for anyone wanting to learn how to add captions or description to educational media.

MORE ABOUT THE DCMP LIBRARY

- The DCMP provides a library of free-loan described and captioned educational media for grades K through 12.
 These materials are available through the U.S. mail, and some are available on the Internet via streaming.
- Anyone working with students who are blind, visually impaired, deaf, hard of hearing, or deaf-blind may apply for free membership.
- In addition, families and students themselves may apply.

MORE ABOUT INFORMATION ON ACCESSIBLE MEDIA

 The DCMP provides a clearinghouse of information related to educational media access. We answer questions such as these: (1) What is description? (2) How can I find someone to add description to my educational media?

- (3) What described educational media is available for loan or purchase?
- The DCMP is a gateway to Internet resources related to accessibility. Performing a search on the DCMP Web site will generate results from the DCMP database as well as results from other educational and consumer Web sites.
- Anyone can use these services at no cost.

- The DCMP has guidelines for anyone who captions educational media.
- Guidelines will be available in 2008 through a partnership with the American Foundation for the Blind for anyone who describes educational media.
- The DCMP offers an evaluation of an agency's quality of captioning or description work.
- Agencies, schools, and others may request free copies of these guidelines.
- Captioning and description agencies desiring to perform work for the DCMP and/or appear on an approved list of service providers may request an evaluation.
