

DESCRIPTION

A cumulative story about a girl who refuses to be scared by a cat, a witch, a bat, and other assorted Halloween fiends who are hiding under an old wooden bridge. Based on the book by Caroline Stutson.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

Subject Area: Language Arts-Reading

- Standard: Uses reading skills and strategies to understand and interpret a variety of literary texts
 - Benchmark: Uses reading skills and strategies to understand a variety of familiar literary passages and texts (e.g., fairy tales, folktales, fiction, nonfiction, legends, fables, myths, poems, nursery rhymes, picture books, predictable books) (See INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS 1 and 3.)

Subject Area: Language Arts-Listening and Speaking

- Standard: Uses listening and speaking strategies for different purposes
 - Benchmark: Recites and responds to familiar stories, poems, and rhymes with patterns (e.g., retells in sequence; relates information to own life; describes character, setting, plot) (See INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS 2.)

- 1. To illustrate a cumulative Halloween story.
- 2. To experience rhythm and rhyme in a poem.
- 3. To promote the reading of children's literature.

BEFORE SHOWING

1. Discuss Halloween. Ask:

- a. What kinds of costumes do you like to wear for Halloween?
- b. What is your favorite thing about Halloween? What is your least favorite thing?
- c. What kinds of feelings do you have on Halloween night?
- 2. Read the book *By the Light of the Halloween Moon* by Caroline Stutson. Discuss:
 - a. What did you think might pop up to tickle the little girl's toe?
 - b. How did the different things that appeared make you feel?
 - c. Why do you think the girl continued to sit there while her toe was tickled by these things?

AFTER SHOWING

Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. What time of year did the story take place? How did you know?
- 2. What was the girl doing on the bridge?
- 3. Discuss why the cat was getting ready to spring on the girl's toes.
- 4. Who snatched at the cat before it sprang on the girl's toes?
- 5. What happened to the witch?
- 6. Who swatted at the bat?
- 7. What happened to the ghoul?
- 8. Who bit the ghost?
- 9. What did the girl say to the sprite?

Applications and Activities

- 1. Dramatize the story. Use simple props and costumes. Paint a moonlit scene for a backdrop. Present the play to other classes and/or parents.
- 2. Replay the video, encouraging recitation of the repeating lines of the story. Identify specific rhyming words and lines. Point out examples of alliteration.
- 3. Brainstorm a list of other Halloween creatures. Create other verses for the poem. Illustrate these additional verses.
- 4. Fold a piece of drawing paper into six boxes numbering them one through six. Draw the creatures that appeared in the poem in order, one per box. On the back, draw the girl.
- 5. Read other cumulative or add-on stories or rhymes. Consider:
 - a. This is the House That Jack Built by Simms Taback.
 - b. Old McDonald.
 - c. One Fine Day by Nonny Hogrogian.
 - d. The Mitten by Jan Brett.
 - e. The Gingerbread Boy by Paul Galdone.
 - f. Stone Soup Marcia Brown.
 - g. There Was An Old Lady Who Swallowed a Fly by Simms Taback.

SUMMARY

Readers will enjoy this bouncy poem about a girl and her toe being followed by a cat, a witch, a bat, a ghoul, a ghost, and a sprite. Each one is trying to steal the "gleaming" toe that shines By the Light of the Halloween Moon.
