
# #10402 THE FUNDAMENTALS OF BASEBALL

# DESCRIPTION

A baseball coach and his young team review and practice the sport's fundamentals. Covers standard baseball terminology, how to grip the



bat and swing, proper fielding techniques, and base running. The kids learn about good sportsmanship, being a team member, and having fun. Animated.

# ACADEMIC STANDARDS

## Subject Area: Physical Fitness

- Standard: Uses a variety of basic and advanced movement forms.
  - Benchmark: Uses basic sport-specific skills for a variety of physical activities (e.g., basketball chest pass, soccer dribble, fielding a softball with a glove). (SEE INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS 1.)
  - Benchmark: Uses mature form and appropriate sequence in combinations of fundamental locomotor, object control, and rhythmical skills that are components of selected modified games, sports, and dances (e.g., combining steps to perform certain dances; combining running, stopping, throwing, shooting, kicking for sideline soccer). (See INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS 1.)
- Standard: Uses movement concepts and principles in the development of motor skills.
  - Benchmark: Understands the critical elements of a variety of basic movement patterns such as throwing (e.g., the ready position, arm preparation, step with leg opposite the throwing arm, follow-through, accuracy of throw). (See INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS 1.)
- Standard: Understands the social and personal responsibility associated with participation in physical activity.
  - Benchmark: Understands the purpose of rules in games. (See INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS 3.)

#### **INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS**

- 1. To describe and demonstrate the baseball skills: hitting, fielding, base running, and throwing.
- 2. To identify equipment used in baseball.
- 3. To introduce and discuss the rules and strategies of baseball.
- 4. To emphasize the importance of the "basics" of the game, practicing, sportsmanship, and being a good team member.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**



The fundamentals of baseball are presented by animated characters Stinky Shoe and Coach LaRoo along with real-life kids and their coach. After a brief warm-up, skills taught are hitting, fielding, base running, and throwing. Rules of baseball are also introduced. Other topics include the importance of practicing, good sportsmanship and a positive attitude, and playing by the rules.

#### **BEFORE SHOWING**

- 1. Introduce the game of baseball. Show equipment (listed but not shown in the media) and describe how each are used. Discuss general rules. Explain baseball vocabulary.
- 2. Discuss the concepts sportsmanship, teamwork, and having a positive attitude. Brainstorm why these are important elements of team sports.

## DURING SHOWING

- 1. View the media more than once, with one showing uninterrupted.
- 2. Stop the media to inform students which skills they will practice.

### AFTER SHOWING

#### **Discussion Items and Questions**

- 1. What is the first thing you do when you arrive at the baseball field? Why do players "warm-up"?
- 2. Winning is not the most important thing in sports. What are some of the other important aspects of team sports mentioned in the media?
  - 3. What equipment is needed in baseball?
  - 4. What are the four critical elements for hitting? Describe each one (i.e., grip, stance, stride, and swing).
  - 5. What are the rules of baseball discussed in the video?
  - 6. How many players are on the field, and what are their positions?
  - 7. Compare different ways a fielder reacts depending on where and how the ball is hit.
- 8. What are the possible ways a batter gets on base? How are they called "out"?
- 9. Discuss all the options for base running depending on where and how the ball is hit.
- 10. What are the critical elements of throwing a baseball?
- 11. What does "practice makes perfect" mean?

#### **Applications and Activities**

1. Perform drills and practice the skills. (See INSTRUCTIONAL GRAPHIC). Use the

graphic to help assess and monitor skills improvement.

- a. Hitting.
- b. Fielding.
- c. Base running.
- d. Throwing.
- 2. Play lead-up games to practice skills.
- 3. Describe and demonstrate how to hit the baseball.
- 4. Draw a diagram of a baseball field. Show on the diagram where the team is on the field. List the names of the positions.



- 5. Measure the baseball field. On your diagram, show the measurements between bases, the plate, the pitchers mound, and the outfield. Calculate how many feet you run if you hit a home run.
- 6. Design and make a poster showing baseball rules. Display it at the field. Explain the rules to younger players.
- 7. Role play good sportsmanship on the field. Show how to resolve conflicts during a game.
- 8. Keep a baseball journal. Write about your skills,



your improvements, your successes, and challenges. Express your feelings about this game and your interactions with your teammates. List the occasions when you supported and encouraged a teammate.

9. Make a collage showing baseball equipment.
