## SHUNTSHUKE IN JAPAN

NEW DIMENSION/QUESTAR, 2000 Grade Levels: 3-6 13 minutes

Ten-year-old Shuntsuke of Kyoto, Japan, highlights a typical family breakfast and later goes to the market with his mother to buy food for a sushi dinner with friends.

- 1. Discuss Japanese food.
  - a. What kind of food does Shuntsuke like to eat?
  - b. What are some common foods from Japan?
  - c. What is eaten at almost all meals?
  - d. What is used as a seasoning or a fresh vegetable?
  - e. What do Shuntsuke and his family drink?
  - f. What is dried fish made of?
  - g. Why do they eat many foods that come from the sea?
- 2. Describe Shuntsuke's activities.
  - a. What kind of shops do Shuntsuke and his mother visit? What kinds of food do they buy?
  - b. Where do Shuntsuke and his mother go after shopping?
  - c. Why does Shuntsuke pet the head of the cow at the temple?
  - d. Why do he and his mother go to the fountain?
  - e. What machine does Shuntsuke play?
- 3. Discuss the meal that Shuntsuke, his mother, and sister prepare.
  - a. How does Shuntsuke make an omelet?
  - b. Why is Japanese food cut up into small pieces?
  - c. How do Shuntsuke and his sister cool off the rice?
  - d. Where do they eat?
  - e. Why does his mother serve the food?
  - f. Why don't they use chopsticks at school?

- 1. Compare an American family and food to Shuntsuke's. Consider family activities and meals. Consider where foods are purchased and how they are prepared.
- 2. Prepare and eat Japanese foods.
- 3. Investigate Japan. Consider climate, geographical features, the people, the customs, and the language.
