

RAMONA: THE PATIENT

DESCRIPTION

Ramona doesn't feel well but goes on to school and throws up in front of her class. While recovering at home, she finds a creative way to present her book report. Excerpt from Beverly Cleary's "Ramona" Quimby, Age 8."



ACADEMIC STANDARDS

Subject Area: Language Arts – Reading

- ★ Standard: Uses reading skills and strategies to understand and interpret a variety of literary texts

 - Benchmark: Understands similarities and differences within and among literary works from various genre and cultures (e.g., in terms of settings, character types, events, point of view; role of natural phenomena) (See Instructional Goal #1.)
 - Benchmark: Makes inferences or draws conclusions about characters' qualities and actions (e.g., based on knowledge of plot, setting, characters' motives, characters' appearances, other characters' responses to a character) (See Instructional Goals #3 and 4.)

Subject Area: Language Arts - Viewing

- ★ Standard: Uses viewing skills and strategies to understand and interpret visual media
 - Benchmark: Understands techniques used to establish mood in visual media (e.g., use of camera angles and distances to create a specific feeling or point of view, tension heightened by dramatic music, sound effects such as a heartbeat or squeaking chair, use of a deep voice, somber lighting to imply mystery or fear) (See Instructional Goal #2.)

INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS

- 1. To compare the story in the video with the book.
- 2. To observe media techniques used to show perspective and imaginative events.
- 3. To write about one's own experiences that have evoked feelings similar to that of the main character.
- 4. To stimulate an interest in literature.

BEFORE SHOWING

10. illustration

- 1. Discuss the title of the video. Brainstorm what the video might be about based on the title.
- 2. Show a copy of Beverly Cleary's book, *Ramona Quimby, Age 8*. Explain that this film is based on one of the stories in the book.
- 3. Review the names of the characters.
 - a. Ramona
 - b. Mr. and Mrs. Quimby
 - c. Beezus (sister)
 - d. Picky-picky (cat)

- e. Mrs. Whaley (teacher)
- f. Mrs. Larson (school secretary)

- g. Howie (classmate)
- h. Beatrice (aunt)

DURING SHOWING

- 1. View the video more than once, with one showing uninterrupted.
- 2. Stop the video after the following scenes to discuss the media techniques used to involve the viewers.
 - a. While Marsha reads her book report about a roller coaster, the video shows a roller coaster ride from the perspective of a rider. The viewer sees what Ramona is imagining as she listens to the report.
 - b. After Ramona throws up, the video shows some students' reactions in slow motion. This gives emphasis to their feelings of repulsion.
 - While Ramona reads Yard Ape's get-well letter, she is reading to herself but the video voices her thoughts. (Notice that Ramona's lips are not moving although words appear on the screen.)
- 3. Stop the video after the following scenes to make predictions about the story.
 - a. Ramona listens to Mrs. Whaley talk about fruit flies and feels increasingly worse.
 - b. Mrs. Quimby brings Ramona a packet that was delivered by Howie.
 - c. Ramona calls her friends for help with her book report.

AFTER SHOWING

Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. Why did Ramona go to school even though she felt sick?
- 2. What happened to the Quimby's car?
- 3. What clues told us that Ramona was feeling worse and worse?
- 4. Why was Ramona so embarrassed when she threw up in class?

- 5. Why was she surprised and worried when her mother came to get her? Why did Mom leave work to bring Ramona home instead of sending her to the babysitter?
- 6. What kind of a patient was Ramona?
- 7. What surprise did Ramona get from her class?
- 8. Why did the class like her book report so much? What did Ramona learn about giving book reports?

Applications and Activities

- 1. Write a letter in cursive to a sick school friend or to Ramona. Tell what has been happening in school during their absence.
- 2. Remember a time you felt sick at school or had to spend a day at home because you were sick. Write a story or draw a picture to describe what happened.
- 3. Act out situations from the video.
 - a. Mr. and Mrs. Quimby struggling with their car
 - b. Ramona getting sick in class
 - c. Ramona giving her book report with help from her two friends
- 4. Choose a book that you think other students would like to read.
 - a. Think of one or more TV commercials you enjoy watching. Create a report using ideas from the TV commercials to "sell" your book.
 - b. Create a mask based on a character in the story.
- 5. Read chapters six, seven, and eight of Ramona Quimby, Age 8. Record the similarities and differences between the book and the video on a Venn diagram.
