



THE DARK SIDE OF DATING: GOSSIP, HURT AND RISKS

DESCRIPTION

Teens cover the dangers and potential negative aspects of dating. Looks at gossip, pressure to have sex, practicing refusal skills, and the risks of sex. Emphasizes the danger of using drugs and/or alcohol on a date, being aware of date-rape drugs, and most critically, standing firm with personal convictions.

- 1. Discuss potential problems in dating.
- 2. Brainstorm ways to have a good, safe dating experience.

AFTER SHOWING

▶ Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. What is gossip? Why is gossip harmful?
- 2. Why is group dating often safer for first dates?
- 3. What can a person do to help deal with pressure? How can you make dating a positive experience?
- 4. What is the meaning of the phrase, "No means no"? What is an example of saying no in a vague way? What is an example of saying no clearly?
- 5. If someone thinks they've been a victim, what should they do?
- 6. Why are drugs and alcohol dangerous on a date? What is a date rape drug?
- 7. What are the risks of sexual intimacy and dating? What can result from unprotected sex? What are common STDs?
- 8. How can a person be sexually responsible? What is the one way to be 100 % safe from the risks of sex?
- 9. Who can you talk to about dating? What can you do ahead of time to prepare yourself for dating?

► Applications and Activities

- 1. Research teen dating topics. Create brochures, posters, or presentations to share with other teenagers.
 - a. abstinence
 - b. age of consent
 - c. alcohol and drugs
 - d. birth control
 - e. date rape drugs
 - f. gossip
 - g. peer pressure
 - h. sexual assault
- 2. Invite a counselor to the class. Consider how to make dating fun and safe, what to be aware of, and who to go to for advice or help.
- 3. Brainstorm how communication issues may influence dating issues between deaf and hearing teenagers.
