## MY MAN BOVANNE

DIRECT CINEMA, 1986

Grade Levels: 8-11

25 minutes



### DESCRIPTION

At a political fundraiser, two older African Americans find romance in spite of interference from one's adult children. Based on a short story by Toni Bambara.

### ACADEMIC STANDARDS

### INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS

1. To examine how this story transmits African American and American culture.
2. To consider the expectations between different generations in a family.
3. To illustrate how adult children may desire social conformity from their parents more than individual happiness for them.
4. To consider that all people regardless of age should pursue happiness.

## BEFORE SHOWING

1. Discuss expectations for attending a party. Consider having your parents at a party with you. List ways that parents could embarrass their children.
2. List your favorite hobbies. Consider if your hobbies will change when you are older.

## AFTER SHOWING

### Discussion Items and Questions

1. How do you know that Mr. Bovanne is blind? Why is he able to move around his home with such ease? How is this different at the party? What does he do to accommodate for his disability?
2. Why did he leave his dog at home? Why is he concerned about his dog dying?
3. What does Mr. Bovanne do and say that show he has a good sense of humor? What do his questions and actions in regard to the skate tell you about him?
4. What kind of party does Mr. Bovanne go to? What is the reason for the party? Who is there? What are they doing?
5. What do Mrs. Peoples and Mr. Bovanne have in common? How do they enjoy themselves at the party?
6. What do Mrs. Peoples' children have a problem with? What do they want their mother to do? What is her response?

### Applications and Activities

1. Read "My Man Bovanne" by Toni Cade Bambara. Compare the short story with the video.
2. Interview adults who are older than you. Ask them how they have personally changed since they were your age and what they would advise you to remember as you become older.
3. Research discrimination. List rights that should be given to all people regardless of their age, sex, race, religion, or sexual orientation.
4. Write a letter from Mrs. Peoples to her children. Consider the years she raised her children, her hopes for the future, and her respect of her children's rights to live their own lives.
